## 31. Failing to incorporate Weak Jump Overcalls

Like a Weak Two opener, a Weak Jump Overcall is a primarily preemptive tool. After the opponents have opened, if you jump overcall at the Two-level, you're showing a weak hand with a decent six-card suit (like a Weak Two opener). If you jump overcall at the Three-level, you're showing a weak hand with a decent seven-card suit (like a Weak Three opener).

Right-hand opponent has opened l. What do you bid with these?

With the first, jump to  $2 \blacktriangle$ , like a Weak  $2 \blacktriangle$  opener.

With the second, however, you have to pass. To jump to 3 ◆ would be too much (a Three-level jump would normally show seven cards — or perhaps, if non-vulnerable, ◆ KQJ1098). Note, you lack the overall strength of hand for a simple overcall of 2 ◆.

With the third, jump to 3\*, like a 3\* opener.

Weak Jump Overcalls happen a lot, way more than the stronger version. They're a very potent weapon in mucking up the opponents ...

What Happened

West led his singleton ◆10. East won ◆Q, cashed ◆A (West discarding) and led ◆2 (a suit-preference signal for the lower-ranking clubs over spades). West ruffed, duly returned ♣8, and East won ♣A and led ◆9. West ruffed again and, with East's ▼A still to score,

- (1) "Only three points, partner."

- (1) Weak Jump Overcall. Low on points, high on playing strength. Very high on disruptive value.
- (2) Stretching a little to show the fit.
- (3) Doesn't know whether partner is stretched or is full value, so pots game.
- (4) Great defensive prospects if partner is short in a minor suit.
